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
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OVERVIEW

Safe Routes to School is a program that aims to make it safer and easier for students to walk and bike to school. The first federally funded Safe Routes to School program was created in 2005, and has since undergone several legislative and policy transformations. In 2012, Congress created the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) by merging together three previous programs that funded active transportation.

OVERVIEW

Throughout 2023, the SICOG SRTS program underwent several changes, including a new SRTS Coordinator. It didn't slow the program down as they participated in National Walk and Roll to School Day with two schools, fostering community involvement and encouraging healthy habits among students. Additionally, they organized a traffic garden event, which provided a practical and interactive learning environment for children to understand traffic safety. A walking audit was conducted at a local charter school to identify and address safety concerns, ensuring a safer environment for students. They also actively engaged with parent-teacher associations by attending several PTA meetings. Their presence at community events such as Welcome Back Orange and Black and the Outer Limits Trick-or-Treat further expanded their outreach and engagement with the public. These events provided opportunities to promote their program and its benefits to a broader audience. A new part-time staff member was recently added to their team to help with outreach across Southeastern Idaho.

Crossing guard training was provided for District 93 and District 91. All of District 93 received in class safety education. They have also partnered with Idaho Mountain Trading and Teton Toyota for the Bike Challenge and end of year event. Idaho Mountain Trading also sponsors other events.

IDAHO SMART GROWTH

Idaho Smart Growth staff participated in three bike rodeos held by SRTS programs. They held monthly support meetings for the SRTS coordinators to discuss things such as data collection, inclusion for all abilities, ADA requirements, notable infrastructure projects across the state and mentorship for new programs. Idaho Smart Growth hosted the annual SRTS Coordinator Convening in Boise, Idaho in October in conjunction with the Idaho Walk Bike Alliance Transportation Summit. In addition to the summit speakers, they had presentations from Vitruvian Planning on ADA requirements. They also had child development considerations in road design and Boise Bicycle Project on their efforts to create a traffic garden in Boise, including site considerations, design and material choices. ISG staff met with new program coordinators to provide support and spoke with communities and elected officials across Idaho to promote the SRTS program and to recruit new programs.

OVERVIEW

October 4, 2023, Walk to School Day

They conduct a bike education program during PE classes with students K-8th grade. Students essentially rotate through various stations learning about bicycle safety, bike anatomy, road signs, pedestrian safety, and free ride practices. They also partner with Adventure Club and Gritman Bike Explorers during the summers to educate the youth in those organizations. They also attend the Farmer's Market and give out educational materials. They also host a "walking school bus" during their walk, bike, and roll to school days. They provided helmets to kids in need at each of their schools. They partner with HWY 95 Palouse Region PEL to support the 2-year study on the effects of US-95 through Moscow.

Besides bike rodeos, they do in class education for K-12. They taught bike/ped safety/law in Drivers ed in Boise Schools in each quarter and two-day long summer sessions. They also presented at the ISDE Driver Education State Conference in April. In several schools they spend between 2 and 4 weeks doing more intense bike/pedestrian education and lead bike rides to different destinations from their schools to show them how to operate on the roads. They have been working this year to re-capture the Boise School District again after falling off during Covid. Things are ramping up quickly and they're already full for the beginning of the 24-25 school year.

They rehabilitated all bikes in the rodeo fleet, rebuilt the scooter headsets, made purchases of incentives, reviewed all presentation materials for updates. They served on the Boise School District Safety Busing Committee. They participate in a myriad of community engagement and training opportunities and events.

OVERVIEW

LPOSD SRTS currently serves twelve schools, up from nine in 2022.

LPOSD SRTS teaches safety education in P.E. classes and sends a monthly newsletter with safety tips.

They have also helped teach kindergarteners how to ride strider bikes. They have also added a one-day per week "walking school bus" at three of their elementary school and teachers receive a stipend to help with the walks. They also continued working with a local bike club the Pend Oreille Pedalers, to hold bike rodeos.
